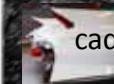

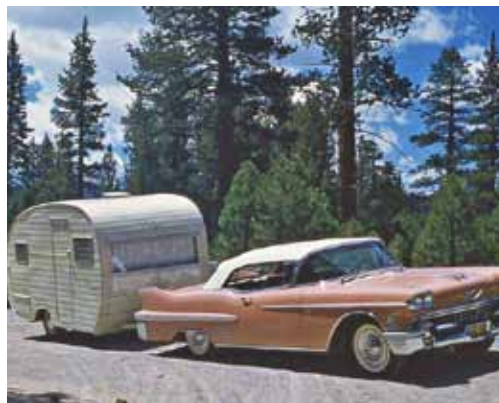

USA - San Francisco - Fred Bausch is running 'hot' in San Fran this summer - look at these blazing examples! Thanks Fred - Ed.

In the mid-1930s, the mileage recommended between oil changes for many new cars was around one-thousand miles, in addition the chassis also needed a "grease job" at the same time. In 1936 the Joseph R. Dick Chevrolet dealership in Pomona, California, installed this up-to-date deluxe Alemite lubritorium system which was complete with a pullout chrome plated oil drain funnel and piping. While the engine oil was draining, seven of the various types of heavy oils and greases needed for a through and correctly done chassis lubrication were readily available to the operator by using all eight of the air-powered and manually operated grease and oil guns supplied with the system. To provide the volume of vehicles necessary to keep this equipment and the operator

busy and profitable the Chevrolet agency had a Frazer's Fotos take this image and turn it into an informative postcard that was sent out to all of the car owners on the mailing list. When a motorist brought their car in for the service, often a well-run service department would also inform the owner about other services and repairs a car might need and also sell those maintenance operations. The car on the "grease rack" appears to be either a 1936 Chevrolet Standard Series Model FC six or a Master Deluxe Model FD which both were equipped with a beam axle and half elliptic springs. The upscale Master Deluxe Model FA came fitted with the Chevrolet "Knee-Action" independent suspension system invented and patented by Andre Dubonnet.

At right - here is an odd couple; this Cadillac convertible appears as if it is pulling a small caravan.



At left a photo of a confident-looking man standing by a blue late-1940s Buick fastback. GM's first Aerodynamic coupe was a concept car Cadillac displayed at the 1933 Century of Progress World's Fair in Chicago; an updated model was first made available to the public in 1936. By the late-1940s when this Buick was constructed the body style was highly refined. Note the Coke-bottle like amber headlight lens' and the curb feelers.

Hanover, New Hampshire is the home of Dartmouth College, a prestigious Ivy League University first established in 1769. The rural college town has never has had a large population, although about ten-percent of its citizens are a part of the academic and administrative staff, many of which earn a relatively high income yearly; this made Hanover a perfect place for [Cont. MORE 'GOOD OIL' FROM FRED: Continued from page 4: Rogers Garage Inc., an automobile dealership which apparently began operations there in the 1910s.

The lead image (previous page 4) shows a view of the Garage taken in 1951 or '52 when it was selling and servicing Packards, however it is not known at this time how long the Garage had been handling the luxury cars. At about this time it appears that the management was able to see the writing on the wall indicating that the Packard Motor Car Company was on its way out. Soon afterward in January of 1953, the firm began selling Chevrolets; the Dealership continued selling with the popular brand until it closed in 1965, and the building was later demolished.



At right >> This mid-1950s Sumner Tunnel Service Station image certainly rates as one of the top ten of more than 225-vintage gasoline station photos posted here on The Old Motor over the years. The Tunnel which passes under the Boston Harbor from the City was first opened to two-way traffic on June 30, 1934. It handled traffic traveling to East Boston and deposited motorists headed into the center of Boston in front this Texaco Station.

Due to the large volume of traffic passing by daily, the building on left side of the station served as one of the best places in Boston for billboards and large painted signs. The large Dubbleware advertisement was a ghost sign for a business that had sold work clothes there in the past, the balance of them advertised the Texaco filling station, and beer and frankfurter companies.

The Gas Station was selling regular gasoline for 27 and 9/10 a gallon and premium for 30 and 9/10; Coke was sold in the machine out front for five cents a bottle. The facility also had a service bay that offered Texaco "Marfak" chassis lubrication and both Kelly and B.F. Goodrich tires.

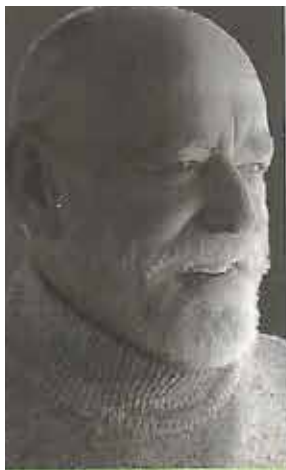

DESTROYED BY SUCCESS *by Jim Richardson*

In 1944 my father was a radioman on a destroyer at Treasure Island near San Francisco. My mother and I took the train from Los Angeles to see him off on a voyage that took him to Iwo Jima, Okinawa and finally Tokyo. We stayed with my great aunt Dolly in Berkeley who drove a dove gray 1940 LaSalle series 52 coupe. I was four years old at the time, and that car was actually the only thing I remember from the occasion. My father filled in all the other details years later.

My earliest childhood memories are just snapshots. They are pictures that are vivid, but have little or no context. That LaSalle was one of those. I just remember at the time thinking that it was the most beautiful thing I had ever seen. I did not know until years later that aunt Dolly's LaSalle was the last of its kind, because they stopped making them after the 1940 model year. That LaSalle stuck with me the rest of my life.

Why that car you ask? That's easy. It is the most beautiful year and model of a beautiful line of cars. LaSalle was originally conceived as a companion make much like Oldsmobile's Viking and Oakland's Pontiac. The Viking didn't last long; but Pontiac – the low priced Oakland offering – ended up consuming its host in 1931.

LaSalle got its start when Harley Earl was hired away from Don Lee Cadillac's custom coachwork shop in 1926. He was given only four months to design Cadillac's new sporty smaller model. He knocked off the handsome Hispano Suizas of the era and added a few flourishes of his own, and the combination was stunning. It was also a major marketing success that year as well.

In fact it was such a success that Earl was put in charge of all General Motors styling and given his own Arts and Colours department. The LaSalle was built to Cadillac standards with a Cadillac chassis and running gear but sold for much less, and as a result it was a major success except for the fact that it was as costly to build as a Cadillac but not nearly as profitable.

As a result, when the depression was in its darkest hour in 1932 management at GM was considering dropping the LaSalle. That is until a young designer in Earl's department named Jules Agramonte left some sketches lying around his work area that featured wind cheating aerodynamic styling reminiscent of the streamlined Sunbeam land speed beach racers that caught Earl's eye.

Earl was impressed, and unveiled it at a show for management and billed it as the car they were not going to build. Management loved it and LaSalle was saved. At least for a time. LaSalles were so stylish that most of GM's management began driving them by the late thirties, including even Cadillac designer Bill Mitchell who later took over as head of the Arts and Colours department when Earl retired.

The goal at LaSalle was to present something trendy every year to reach the people who wanted something new and daring. It was the opposite of Packard's less expensive junior series 120 that debuted in 1935. Packard always aimed at the conservative end of the market, and as a result their styling was evolutionary rather than revolutionary. They also stayed with the Packard name for their new models in order to capitalize on the prestige that the marque enjoyed at the time.

LaSalle, and the mid-thirties Cords were the trendsetters of the era and played off one another, but Packard kept to the neo-classical look. The LaSalle still sold very well, but the profits weren't there in the numbers that GM management expected. The Packard 120 sold far better, with 1937 being Packard's best year ever thanks to their new junior offerings.

But both companion makes turned out to have their downsides. LaSalle did not trade on Cadillac's prestigious name and was not the runaway success that Packard's cheaper line was, but then Packard ended up losing the prestige market to Cadillac who grabbed it by dropping the LaSalle name but continuing to make the same car under the Cadillac brand. Both companies built great cars, but it came down to branding and positioning in the end.

These days I would say I am a blessed because I have a 1939 Packard 120 and a 1940 LaSalle. They are two entirely different cars built to reach two different markets, but comparable in quality and performance. Pharmacists and doctors drove junior series Packards, and people like Hedy Lamarr drove LaSalles.

The Packard is dignified and silent, and the LaSalle is brash and has a throaty rumble. They each get a lot of attention because they are both beautiful in their own way, but one looks aristocratic and the other looks exciting. For me my 1940 LaSalle Series 52 coupe is a lifelong dream come true. Now if you will excuse me, it's time for a spin.

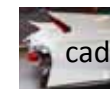

Was registered with the plates FINS while in Taupo. Originally the plate was CF 8398 ??, all Dannevirke plates had CF



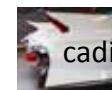

1977 Eldorado Biarritz

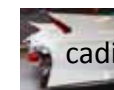
My 1977 Eldorado was the 2nd old car I purchased, in March of 1992, joining my 1966 DeVille convertible in the garage. However, it was not an impulse purchase.

Back then, on my drive home from work, I typically had to stop at a stoplight in front of the local Ford dealer. Their used car lot was on my side of the street. In the autumn of 1991 I noted a vintage large Eldorado in the back row of the lot. I looked at the car, noticed it had a moonroof, and EFI, and was the Biarritz model. I didn't think much about it, though noted it was there all winter. Spring came and someone wrote in to the technical column of the Self Starter, asking how many Biarritz's were made in 1977 and 1978. I forget the exact number for 1977 but noted only 404 were made with the moonroof. I thought to myself, "this is a rare car", and even more rare with the Electronic Fuel Injection option. So I decided it needed to be saved and preserved. After some negotiation with my wife, I convinced her of the need to acquire the car. I set off to the dealer one way with cash in my hand. I figured they would be ready to move the car, after sitting there for several months, and being a big gas hog, interest in it wouldn't be that high. It also ran rough (subsequently found to be a bad EGR valve, unique to EFI engines), which helped lower the price some too.

So I brought it home that day.

The car currently is fully optioned. When I bought it, it was missing a trunk mat and floor mats, which I have subsequently obtained. I have had its Buckskin Firemist paint repainted as it did have a little rust, and the 1970's base coat/clear coat paint had peeling clear coat in areas. The interior and vinyl top are original, and it has about 62,000 miles (99800 km) on it. I have had only minimal issues with the fuel injection, and it purrs like a kitten. It starts right up too without any pumping of the gas pedal. The auto leveling works, as it does on all my cars that came with it. I am the club technician for the system, so I make an effort to make sure they all work!

The car has a softer suspension than my 1968 and 1972 Eldorado's. With the pillow leather seats, it is like floating down the road on air. Another interesting option it has is the digital AM-FM radio. It was the first year it was offered. It basically is a regular AM-FM radio, but with a digital LED display. Thus the clock is on it. The usual analog clock up on the dash is not there, with a "delete" plate in the place where it would go. Despite the "new for 1977" smaller 425 cubic inch engine, it is pretty peppy, and I can't tell a big difference from it and the 1976 500 cubic inch engine. The EFI engine does have 15 horsepower more than the carbureted one. It is one of my daughters' favorite cars due to the pillowy soft interior.

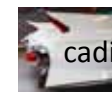
Rick's had saved us some parking outside and I reckon we made a jolly good look to the place.

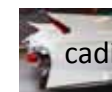

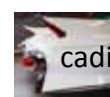
