Recently I read about a cool 1947 Cadillac that possessed such amazing elements it was hard to believe this all happened in the early 1950s! Have a read by Googling Louie Mattar Cadillac on YouTube.

Now here's an interesting yet true story of a man by the name of Louie Mattar who grew up in Detroit. A retired garage owner, respected engineer and inventor, Mattar developed numerous devices for automakers and the U.S. military, including a mine sweeper for the Navy. His greatest achievement may have been the extensively modified 1947 Cadillac Fleetwood he designed and built over a period of years, constantly altering it to make it ever more capable, self-sufficient, and complex. That was the car in which he and two pals made their epic twoway cross country journey in the early 1950s. As if LA to New York and back without stopping wasn't adequate proof of the Caddy's capability and the team's endurance, they followed up two years later with a continent-bisecting non-stop drive from Anchorage, Alaska, to Mexico City. When the story reads 'non-stop', it means 'non-stop'. No stopping for gas, oil changes, going to the bathroom, eating, showering, changing a tyre - not even for a traffic light or stop sign! f space is the final frontier then Chris Salisbury and his partner Guide Pohlmann have reached the outer limits of their 'couple shed'. When they started collecting cars 15 years ago, the time-travelling dou thought their former factory in an industrial area of Melbourne had more than enough room to not only house a few cars but also Chris's memorabilia and a zone for relaxing and entertaining But then came the Cadillacs.

With the workshop measuring only 17x 10 metres—about 2.5 Cadillacs long by two Cadillacs wide—it quickly became gridlocked and Chris had no alternative but to put three cars into orbit on mobile hoists that can be rolled out for his annual Boxing Day BBQ. Apart from a small lounge area' bar and a mezzanine accomodation space, it's jammed.

I am sure our Ozzy cozzies are hoping it will not be a repeat of that infamous

cancelled CTS export order around a decade ago...much to us Kiwis delight! Ed

Cadillac Returning To Australia With Showrooms In Malls Cadillac is renting out space in Australian malls and will reportedly use the storefronts to sell the Lyriq, Optiq, and Escalade IQ in their own high-end spaces Cadillac is reportedly planning a long-awaited return to the Australian market and will borrow a page from Tesla's playbook. Rather than

selling its vehicle from General Motors Specialty Vehicles (GMSV) showrooms, it will establish its own stores in malls around the country. Cadillac hasn't sold vehicles in Australia since 1969, but it has come close to reentering the market a few times since then. However, now that the luxury brand is experiencing a sea change as it transitions

to electric technology, it appears to be using the opportunity to go international. To do that, it has been renting space in high-end shopping malls around Australia in anticipation of an upcoming launch, reports Car Expert, citing unnamed sources. This follows reports that the brand has filed Aussie trademarks for the model names "Lyria," "Optia,"


and "Escalade IQ."

The move will allow Cadillac to have its own, high-end spaces near the same stores that customers shop for other luxury goods. It's a strategy that is gathering increasing traction over the traditional dealership model with EV manufacturers. However, the brand is not ready to reveal its plans yet. "GM participates in select right-hand-drive markets around the world. We have

previously said that the modular Ultium platform and EV architecture offer greater flexibility in vehicle configurations," a GM Australia spokesperson said. "We do not have any product announcements to share at this time but stay tuned." These reports follow the revelation that Cadillac is also trying to take on the European market. The automaker recently added Switzerland to its whitelist of countries, and more European markets are expected to be added soon. While the specifics of its plans for Australia remain a mystery, in Switzerland, the Cadillac Lyric will sell for CHF82,000. That's the equivalent of \$89,600, which is significantly more than the sub-\$60,000 price tag it has in America.



Cadillac begins global electric push - is Australia




'It is only a passing fad' some at the time said. However, the pioneers at the period, Carl Benz, Henry Ford, Henry Leland, and others saw the future differently. Entrepreneurs also saw dollar signs in their (auto) future (Billy Durant and his new General Motors organisation). The 1800s had created significant wealth because of the introduction of the railways. The 1900s heralded the 'car/ truck' and other fuel-powered machinery notwithstanding others at the time tinkered with steam and electrically powered horseless carriages too. My recreational reading over past years (mainly American-sourced where most of the car innovation arose and progressed) has enlightened me to understand that complexities with both steam and electric (in particular, possible range) vehicles meant that even though the first ICE vehicles were not particularly reliable and petrol was not only a dangerous commodity to handle/ use, many of the early ICE examples simply didn't run very well and until the two Henrys came on board. Engineering was pretty basic requiring replacement of rings and many other mechanical components on a regular basis! One of the most interesting and fascinating things my reading uncovered was that in the late 1800s and early 1900s, the streets in major US cities were congested with horses...and their droppings! In fact, I have read that it was so bad that it became a major health-hazard! Hence, the arrival of an alternative form of transport was welcomed by those who cared about health and improving life generally.

As ICE vehicles became more acceptable (read – roading was improved, new roads created, vehicles became more reliable and practical), horses were culled in their hundreds of thousands! By time the First World War had ended, there was hardly a horse to be seen, except on a farm or for recreational or racing circles. The most interesting 'parallel' from the 1900s to today is over the past 100+ years of 'black gold' from the earth converted into oil, petrol, diesel and other derivatives has again (like horse poo) become a 'health hazard' and like over 120 years ago, those today in 2023 who value our future health and well being (and improving life generally) are supportive of non-fossil powered transportation! And like over a century ago, the new evolution means greater efficiencies, power and design/ safety.

I have just read that in the Second Quarter of this year, Tesla had the two best-selling cars in California by a wide margin. The best seller was the Tesla Model Y selling nearly 75,000 units through June 2023. Second was the Model 3 with 42,000 units sold. In number three slot was Toyota Camry with 27,000 units sold followed by the Toyota Rav4 with 26,000 units sold. Telsa's sales soared 62% compared to Q2, 2022 whereas Toyota's shrunk by 8%. The result is significant enough to embarrass Toyota, the top-selling brand in climate-conscious California for many years by a 20-year old company (Tesla) with only four models! As one commentator said, "If that doesn't light a fire under Toyota's ass, I don't know what will!" As a footnote, the top selling vehicle in NZ in September was the Tesla Y and EV type vehicles accounted for 65% of the NZ market! For us Cadillac enthusiasts there could be a Cadillac EV in our future, IF the price is affordable?

However, one thing seems certain: the legacy firms' (GM/ Ford/ Chrysler/ Toyota/ VW/ Mercedes/ BMW) dream of an "orderly transition" to EVs (by which they mean that they'll be able to continue selling dinosaur-burners until they've recouped their investments in 20th-century factories) are a fantasy. An incumbent firm that wants to beat Tesla, BYD and other upstarts (little Rivian has been selling more electric pickups than Ford) is going to have to drop the horse-and-buggy mentality and commit itself 100% to EVs, and accept a world of financial pain. But there's no sign that any of the old-line automakers currently have any intention of doing so. Ed


