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

Our planned seven hour round trip to lowa turned into a 15 hour adventure with actual marketable movie rights. Our borrowed trailer worked out fine, the borrowed truck - not so much. A 2003 Ford F-350 with a Triton V-10 and 70,000 lovingly driven miles (as a snow plow).

The fuel filler neck on our towing truck was Oklahoma engineered with no air gap, taking about 30 minutes to fill the tank and the "guess gage" (that's what we learned to call the gas gauge) left us stranded a quarter mile past the middle of nowhere on the trip to Iowa. He chatted with Fred, offered to go back to his house and return with his truck and the correct tools to do the job. In currency, the extra added expense was around \$300. We added about eight hours of time to our day between fuel and transmission issues, but we also met one of the nicest people you could ever hope to encounter.

The real lesson is that this world is still full of enough good people to make it worth your while to stop and help a stranded motorist once in a while. Sure you could just be rolling up on a carjacker or bank robber that ran out of gas and simply wants to swap out your car for the broken one, and that's not a happy ending; but you may also meet a couple of Cadillac Club members in need and get paid for your efforts like Steven did.

Either way, Fred declared the car much nicer than he thought it would be, and it appears he is right. So aside from the additional expenses, all's well that ends well.






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Congratulations to the proud new family of a 1969 Cadillac deVille Convertible
