




Showcase Caddy!

Here's a good 'case-in-point' where following an approach from me, a member replies with a cool story about their Cdddy accompanied by a few photos. This not only makes great reading for fellow members, but also an opportunity to enjoy and appreciate another members ride! Many thanks Doug and Dee (Denise) from Whitianga, Bay of Plenty members for dropping me a line. Lovely Caddy, thanks for sending in your story. Ed [Hey members, send me a story - Ed]

We've owned the car for three years having traded our 70 convertible and a fair bit of cash First imported to NZ in early 2000's it got complied and sat in a private collection for years.

When the owner of the collection passed it went through a couple of quick changes of ownership before we got it.

Upon purchase we had a complete service including all oils and filters, rebuilding the carburetor, rebuilding the brake master cylinder, rebuilding the vacuum wipers and the vacuum pump driven off the oil pump in the sump, new lifters and all ignition components replaced. The fuel tank had been replaced prior to us getting the car but we took out the sender unit and fuel gauge to have them calibrated.

As far as I can tell everything on the car is factory spec the only exception is a transistor assist to take the voltage out of the points.

We've travelled many miles throughout the North Island including Americarna and a couple of Beach Hops and three Cadillac Nationals. Our only breakdown was when the fuel pump decided it had had enough while returning from a trip to Stratford. Luckily a new pump was available quickly from overseas and we were able to return to the Naki a month later for the Americarna!

Following a brief sortie in the New Zealand market in 2009 with factory-built right-hand drive CTS sedans, Cadillac is returning with the all-electric 2025 Lyriq crossover utility vehicle which is built on a dedicated right-hand line in the Spring Hill plant in North America.

Hamilton-based Ebbett Group acquired the entire inventory of Cadillac CTS vehicle and spare parts from General Motors when the brand's launch in the Australian market was postponed indefinitely in 2009.

Now, luxury EV buyers in New Zealand (and Australia) will be the first to purchase the righthand drive Cadillac Lyriq following its global reveal in Australia on November 15. The move has been long-expected, with multiple outlets predicting the move, including AutoTalk.

GM Australia and New Zealand managing director Jess Bala says the Cadillac EV portfolio in both markets would begin with the Lyriq, and grow with more entries.

"Cadillac will be in a position to offer a fully electric portfolio by 2030," said Bala. "Launching our Cadillac EV business in Australia and New Zealand positions us well to be able to select the right models for these markets – just as we are doing with Lyriq."

General Motors will open a Cadillac Experience Centre in Auckland, as well as one in Sydney and Melbourne to facilitate this. In a sit-down with media event Bala would not be drawn on what form the centres would take, other to confirm 'it will not be a traditional dealership.'

Together with an online presence that will enable customers to explore and buy, Bala says these will be the foundations of the retail strategy for the Cadillac EV business in Australia and New Zealand. "Our Experience Centres will be destination locations, where customers can discover more about Cadillac as a modern luxury brand and explore, test drive, and buy a Lyriq," Bala says.

"Whether customers want to shop fully online or in-store, we will provide experiences that engage the senses, anticipate desires, and enable our customers to go on extraordinary journeys," she says. Cadillac global vice president John Roth says the introduction of a right-hand-drive Lyriq will enable new opportunities in important markets where EV adoption is strong.

The car itself is big – sized marginally bigger than an Audi etron – at nearly 5-metres long.

While not confirmed, the only drivetrain option expected for Australasia is all-wheel drive with dual motors outputting a combined 370kW and 615Nm. Range is rated at 506km from the 100kWh battery.

A Court Battle Victory is a Win for Shelby Owners

After a long-standing legal dispute, the U.S. District Court for the Central District of California has ruled in favor of the Shelby Trust in its battle against Denice Halicki over the rights to the "Eleanor" car. This decision marks a significant moment in the automotive industry, particularly for the legacy of the revered Shelby vehicles.

The conflict centered around the use of "Eleanor," a code name given to various Mustangs featured in H.B. "Toby" Halicki's films including the original "Gone in 60 Seconds" and its 2000 remake. Denice Halicki, Toby's widow, claimed that all cars referred to as "Eleanor" across these films constituted a single copyrightable character and that her rights to this character were infringed upon by the Shelby Trust's activities.

Halicki went to the extent of suing Shelby GT500 vintage manufacturers and car owners, alleging that their vehicles infringed on her supposed copyright interests because they resembled the "Eleanor" car from the 2000 movie remake.

This aggressive stance by Halicki forced the Shelby Trust to initiate legal action to protect its licensees and the owners of Shelby GT500s.

The court, in a detailed judgment, dismissed Halicki's claims, finding her representations about the movies to be misleading or embellished. It concluded that the "Eleanor" vehicles depicted in the movies do not qualify for "character" copyright protection. This verdict is a relief to the Shelby Trust and its affiliates, who can now continue their operations without fear of litigation from Halicki. In Memoriam ~ Bruce Jefferies CLCNZ Member 2013 to 2023

Last issue I mentioned about salatuting past members who have departed us. Our 'Roll of Honour' appears on our very important Directory page, meanwhille I have been permission to share some memories of Bruce Jefferies, BoP Region.

It is with great sadness we inform everyone that CLC NZ Member, Bruce Jefferies of Taupo (BoP Region) passed away on October 23rd, 2023, at age 83. Bruce was born to Lance and Viv Jefferies in Feilding in 1940, the eldest of three children (sister Julie who was at the service and brother Noel – previously deceased). He was married to Beth who sadly passed away when son, Cameron was eight. Some years later, Bruce remarried to Trish and were together over 30 years. Both have been members of the CLC NZ since 2013. In addition to the CLC, Bruce also held a long membership with the Model Ford A club and the Bay of Plenty VCC. Bruce was born on a sheep farm near Feilding and later ran the family farm for many years and had a passion for ploughing, competing in NZ championships and even attending the 50th World Championships in Canada. He was also known as having the straightest fence post lines of anyone! Bruce was very good at fixing stuff and widely known as 'a fixer' and loved cars as a kid. He joined the VCC Manawatu in 1995 solidifying his love of old cars with a passion for the 'Ford family'. He and Trish attended the 100-year Anniversary of the Model T in Dearborn, USA in the early 2000s and Trish recalled (in her sermon) that Bruce was 'in his element' as the hotel where they stayed even had images of Henry Ford on the walls of their room! Cars gave Bruce one of his greatest pleasures. Only this past Labour weekend, Bruce and Trish took their Ford Pickup to a Ford Truck event in Wanganui, a meeting that Bruce enjoyed immensely. In a hangar storage unit by Taupo airport, he had several Fords from a Model A to 1930s, 40s, and a 50s Mercury Monterey and what friends and family called 'the land yacht' - his '66 Cadillac Sedan DeVille (which as Cadillac enthusiasts know is part of the 'Henry Leland/ Henry Ford Family Tree' as is the Lincoln intertwined within the branches of Ford history). Bruce and Trish enjoyed driving their cars to meets and events travelling together and spending time with their man carfriends and grandchildren. A very active man despite a quad-ripple heart bypass 28 years ago, Bruce only recently talked about walking up to the top of Mt. Maunagnui, Bruce is survived by Trish and son Cameron, daughter-in-law Erin and grandchildren in Tauranga. Rest in Peace Bruce and may you meet up with your two Henry idols.

Complied by Ron Melville via Taupo Funeral Services online Service (due to the writer being in Covid isolation). Bruces casket was loaded into his immaculate 40s Ford pickup and camera coverage 'panned' many VCC members cars in attendance. In lieu of dropping rose petals, lavender, or the like on the casket (sitting on the back tray of the truck) everyone was given a 'Ford' sticker to 'peel and adhere to the top, side or end of the casket.' A very novel and appropriate farewell to Bruce.

Trish later communicated with me and added these wonderful details:

Bruce's sister Julie was at his service, and we have just celebrated her 80th with her. She resides in Whangamata. Also, after laying in front of our lounge window (Bruce) for nearly six days enjoying his much loved view, he was also taken to the chapel on the back of his beloved '47 Jail bar truck. The gentleman who originally restored that truck (87 yrs. old now) was at the graveside when Bruce was laid to rest at the little churchyard next to his farm. Everyone hoed in with shovels and filled his plot for him. Our history with cars has always been that they become members of our family. None ever kept less than 18 years, except the one he won at Americarna. The Caddy is a much-loved member, as the rest are.

Our condolences to Trish and family and we extend an invitation to Trish or Cameron for the club to help in anyway in regard to advice or information regarding Bruces Cadillac or any of his extensive memorabilia. Ron

Ghosts of good decisions

It's as clear as Bowen, Murphy, Black, and White

ften in life, we second-guess decisions that we have made because we wonder if things could have gone better.

But what happens when things go more than right? Consider it is 1902. You are Lemuel Bowen, a major investor in what had originally been the Detroit Automobile Co., reborn the previous year as the Henry Ford Co. You've had a major falling out, and the young Mr. Ford has left for various reasons.

With a shell of a company and a few automobiles on hand, you decide to call in an expert to appraise the remains. This expert, Henry Leland (although he could have called Horace Dodge, as both were building engines for R.E. Olds), advises the four directors (Lemuel Bowen, William Murphy, Clarence Black, and A.E.F. White) not to liquidate. Rather, the excellent chassis produced by the company could be coupled with his own, better-quality, single-cylinder engine to create a viable car company. What decision do you make?

We all know that the Cadillac Automobile Co. was thus born. Lemuel Bowen became Cadillac's first president. Henry Leland was the general manager. He was still listed as the proprietor of Leland & Faulconer Machine Co. on the members' list of The Automobile Club a year later in 1903. This firm was the supplier of engines to Cadillac as well as other automobile companies.

What? We have always heard Henry Leland started Cadillac, so who was Lemuel Bowen? Bowen was a well-connected businessman in Detroit. He had been treasurer and general manager of D.M. Ferry Seed Co. He was a vice president of the Security Trust Co., a director of the Michigan Fire & Marine Insurance Co., and a vice president of the Standard Accident Insurance Co.

So, how did he know Leland? Were they neighbors? Did they go to the same church? Maybe he knew Leland by reputation or by some stroke of luck. Perhaps we will never know. Wilfred and Henry Leland showed up with the appraisal documents and also a tested and reliable 9.5 HP engine. Leland signed a contract to supply engines, and Lemuel Bowen agreed to purchase them. Alanson Brush and Ernest Phipps, who worked for Leland & Faulconer Machine Co., massaged the chassis.

Hussey provided the early bodies. William Metzker signed on as sales manager, used the artwork from a Hussey Body Co. ad for the first Cadillac advertisement, and took them to the New York Auto Show, where he secured 2,000 orders, declaring the first year of production was "sold out." What a continuous string of good decisions!

Fast forward to 2020, when Helen Bowen Osterwald of Kalamazoo, Michigan, approached Art and Janet Riley, inquiring if there was any CLC Museum & Research Center interest

in portrait artwork of her great-grandfather, Lemuel Bowen, the first president of Cadillac. Although the artwork is from a time later than 1903, it now hangs proudly in our gallery.

The crest has landed

(and so has one of the first LaSalles)

he fabulous hand-carved limestone Cadillac crest that had adorned the Cadillac Sales and Service Building in downtown Detroit at 6001 Cass Ave. has landed at the CLCMRC. For over 100 years, it stood guard at the top of that nine-story building, braving the elements and pigeon droppings. After being removed from the building designed by noted architect Albert Kahn, the crest sat forlornly in a former service bay of what was the usedcar prep area for the past seven years.

Finally, in March 2022, the building owners called to say that it was available, but would have to be removed at our cost. The crest, which weighs an estimated 10,500 pounds, was expertly handled by Lee Machinery Movers, and stored at their Pontiac facility while plans

could be made for mounting. A plan was devised by Curator and CLCMRC Past President Tim Pawl to design a mount that incorporated much-needed bench-style seating. Earley & Associates of Kalamazoo was contracted as masons for the project. Its team expertly excavated, poured the foundation, and built the forms for the new base.

On a warm and sunny
September morning just a few weeks
before the Cadillac Fall Festival, the crest
was moved onto the bench/cradle for
dramatic drop placement. The fact that
the two pieces had never met lent to
the excitement. With a few abracadabras,
they fit together perfectly. The masons
were in awe of the hand-carving and
commented about the attention to detail,
including a front face that leans forward
about six degrees with a slight ledge at
the top so that the pigeons could never
make deposits on the face.

Special thanks to Don Ghareeb and family, who generously funded the entire move and installation; Sue and Ed Pashukewich, who followed through checking its whereabouts during the seven-year quest to obtain it; Alan Haas and Paul Ayres, for their time to inspect and document; Tim Pawl, for managing the project and designing the bench/ cradle; and the staff of the Gilmore Car Museum. In addition, Denis Binette, Mark Brodsky, Len Constance, Tony DeLellis, and Stephen Page have stepped up as we continue to landscape, make signs, and perhaps re-create the crown. The original drawings of the crown have been found at the Albert Kahn Legacy Foundation.

It has become an instant photo opportunity for all visiting to take a picture at the crest.



Another new addition to the CLCMRC collection arrived in October. A much-coveted, first-year 1927 LaSalle Series 303, Model 7380 Five-Passenger Sedan was donated by Leonard Piszkiewicz of Santa Clara, California. This wonderful example of the first car designed by Harley Earl for General Motors is featured on page 32 of LaSalle: Cadillac's Companion Car, and is one of just 5,001 built.




