

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Our Auckland Weekend! For a few years now, the Club has been tossing around the idea of organising a trip to Auckland, primarily to meet fellow Auckland members. Nothing had

happened until I had the fortune to ride 'shot gun' with Auckland Member, Steve Barker on a couple of days at the February 2024 AmeriCARna due to my radiator springing a leak! During our cruising around, a pair of guys will talk about all sorts of things, mainly cars and when I mentioned about us Tauranga members coming up to Auckland sometime, he leaped at the idea and undertook to organise something.

Steve suggested he maybe able to organise to view a few 'sheds' for us and he'd arrange a 'meet up' with Auckland members. The idea blossomed over winter, and it was agreed we'd coincide our visit with the first Mequiars Coffee & Cars of summer, held on the 20th October at the Auckland Showgrounds, an event that is held regularly until around April and usually attracts over 1,000+ cars! So, it was with intricate organisation and fine-tuning of dates, times and shed details that we fixed a weekend date. Steve found a marvellous motel that was modest in cost and provided discrete off-road Parking for our Caddies. An agenda was created and all we needed was participants! non-descript very secure storage building located amongst the many other newish buildings in a Commercial area. Whilst Dave is receptive to "some" car clubs viewing, he apparently is selective and only allows those willing to pay a 'donation' to local Hospice (akin to an 'Admission fee') and the collection is viewed on the basis of no photos. NO PHOTOS. Hence, it was very frustrating to look over what must be one of NZ's most amazing collections and be only able to keep a record of it 'in your mind!' What makes this collection so special? Presentation/ Marketing is extremely high, attention to detail beyond what us Kiwis are used to! Makes of bikes were from US, Britain, Japan, Germany, Italy. Old ones, really old ones; 50's, 60's 70s and more. The

cars - Chevs, Fords, Mopar, one Cadillac, one Studebaker. A couple of pick-ups, some Rods. Now here is where the 'point of difference' was: On the bikes, there was not a 'speck of dust or arime'. On the cars, the same, I looked through the open windows, under the hood (where open) and crawled on the ground and looked under-side. Almost every car looked as if it had been dis-assembled and put back together again but with new hood lining, new upholstery, new car door cards, new dash,

new gauges/ The chassis was fully painted also! All the shocks, springs, exhaust looked like it probably was when it left the factory. Not a speck of dirt here either. Top Row - We stopped And get this – every old car had current Registration and a WOF! I saw one and then another and looked at them all as I walked from one to one. I cannot recall up with longtime how many there were exactly, maybe in excess of 100? One could argue that these examples are probably better than maybe how they looked when new! And of course, each had a oil drip tray just in case (as if!) and the entire floor was arrived in son, Jamie's painted and immaculate, no tyre marks, not slippery. At the end of the extensive equistite dark green viewing, most of us visited the equally impressive immaculate and highly spec'd toilets! Standards equal to many a top class show home! My favs? I liked a '58 Mopar done in a sparkling metallic bronze. This Plymouth was similar to 'Christine' but younger with the 'faux spare wheel'. I am not a truck person, but the '60 (?) Chev Apache was a close second, a '59 DeSoto, third. It was in my top three loves at this amazina ensemble that's for sure. Finishina up we thanked Dave

profusely and 'floated away' to have a bite to eat in nearby Silverdale at 'Joes Garage' for lunch. This is an upmarket, glitzy 'Bar and Grille' where all ages are welcome and a great selection of food for nearly every palate. Parking was a little tight and the locals fretted a little to see Cadillacs squeeze alongside those Kias! A superb location for a bite to eat and another great recommendation by Steve B. Then on the road again, this time north of Orewa to Warkworth via the new Puhoi road and tunnel where we landed at the Sharpe Shop. A Ford man through and through, we initially saw a few interesting and quality Ford products upstairs only to discover that below this concrete building was akin to an Aladdin's Cave of immaculate 30s Fords, a project '59 Buick and completed old cars awaiting their final touches (and likely VIN) for their new owners. Many of these examples were said to have changed hands for in excess of six figures and when you witnessed the quality of the paint work, interior, engine bay with all the chrome, like-new glass and what appeared to look like 'period correct' seating, headlining and timber dashboards, one could see the attraction of some mighty fat wallets! The photos speak for themselves. Whilst there and wandering outside, the 'chug' of a veteran 1904 Cadillac drew lots of attention. Some VCC club owners had apparently returned from a local VCC Rally and their custom trailer was specially parked to load-up the Caddy. We had the opportunity to look over it and speak with its owner who told us it was ex-Australia! Maybe some of you in the CLC Aust may recall it? It was in pristine condition and a fine example against any brand of the period. Following a very successful look at the Sharpe shop, a suggestion was made to go check out Mr. Sharpe senior's multi car garage, just a Km or so away up a very steep local hill! Like most great collections, it too was tucked-away down a right of way and under a house with enough room for nine cars I guesstimated. Again, it was a Fordophiles dream. 30s Fords of many descriptions some complete, some not. A small collection of interesting memorabilia to go with the garage and yet another intriguing find! Time seemed to be flying, and we had to hit the road for there was more to do back in Auckland. With Steve G, Ozy and Brian Barron on board, we made a detour at Silverdale whilst Ozy invested in a new battery for the 300c. An ice cream was very much in order! 


