



In '65 they stacked 'em high! 65


STACKED HEADLIGHTS and the '65s conclude in this issue.



79-Year-Old Hot Rod Granny Wins Burnout Competitions in Her Classic Cadillac

Annie Koehler, a 79-year-old grandma from rural Illinois, is proving that growing older doesn't need to be boring. She takes pride in going against the common standard of what people think happens with age and celebrates life in a different way: by doing big smokey burnouts in her bigblock powered hot rod, a 1957 Cadillac Series 62 Coupe de Ville. Nicknamed the "Hot Rod Granny," Annie was first discovered she emailed The Drive with an irresistible opening line: "I think you might like to see me doing static burnouts in my Caddy." According to the news outlet, she elaborated further by mentioning she has eight grandkids and while she's relatively new to the car hobby, she's "hooked" after winning a few burnout contests. She was reaching out to learn of more contests, writing, "If you know of any, please let me know. I can do rolling burnouts but prefer the standing still ones. I think the radical, moving ones might be too hard on my old Caddy." Annie's classic white wall tire shredding Cadillac was built by her son, Jamie Hutchins who owns an engine shop in Bethaldo, Illinois. It's powered by a naturally aspirated big-block Chevy V8 that's been bored out to 496 cubic inches. "I've sure had a lot of fun with it," Annie said. In fact, as soon as the build was finished, she took her hot rodded Caddy on a 4,200-mile road trip to California and back, entering burnout competitions along the way. She even started her own YouTube channel where she posts her burnout videos:


AUSTRALIA - Perth - Hi Ron. A little info on a recent meeting in WA recently. 13 cars attended the Hot Rod and Classic Car spectacular here in Mandurah.

Always enjoy your newsletter and have been watching for my old yellow '60 coupe deville which has supposedly gone to NZ. [Never seen it anywhere Murray, but you never know what may turn up. Do you know what city it went to? Ed]

The white '53 Eldorado with red/white interior belongs to Warren Crawford. I'm sure you'll remember him from the workshop tours. He also had the Yellow 53 Eldorado and an Aztec Blue '53 Eldorado which he's since sold. His '31 V16 is outstanding as well. The white '49 convertible belongs to Rob Winsall who bought along a couple of mates from the Knights car club. The black 65 limo belongs to Mark Caffieri while the pink '56 series 62 coupe is my latest endeavour with a LS1 transplant. The transplant LS 1 is from a 2005 Holden VY S S Ute . With that comes the 4L65 Automatic Transmission. To complete the conversion we needed to purchase "block hugger" exhaust manifolds, obviously the new aluminium radiator, modify the tail shaft and enlarge the hole through the chassis. Differential. is still the original Cadillac which runs the 3.07 rear end, and ironically that's identical to the Holden Ute.

Brakes are still the original Cadillac, including all the hydraulics, but I think going through compliance with the transport department. I'm gonna have to modify to a dual system, and possibly if they insist on it a collapsible steering column. While we were doing the transplant, I decided to update the instruments, and added an Intellitronix digital dashboard, I went with that brand because Dakota digital were about \$3000 US, and this one was only about \$700 installed. If you look at the pic you'll see I'm cruising down the freeway 99km/h at 1536 revs, cool as a cucumber. Now I've done nearly 2000 km and fuel economy is 13.4 L per hundred kilometres. All in all an interesting exercise, but it'll be even more so when I get the compliance requirements from transport department.

New Plymouth is an interesting place and I spent many a day there during my oilfield career, at the auto Lodge motel. Bit of a barfly back then.Keep up the good work, mate, regards Murray Bollen, CLC WA [Good on you Murray. Great story and update. Send me a story and photos anytime and best regards, Ed]

At the recent AmeriCARna, I came across a man who told me what he had learned about his *new* old car. Being a bit 'vintage' himself, he remarked that he was always open to new knowledge and I took the following comment on board and told three others and it worked for the four of us Caddy owners.

This gentleman had found it would take several 'turning overs' of his engine to fire up, when cold. His *new* old car had an owners manual in the glove box and it recommended:

"Do NOT 'pump' the accelerator when attempting to start. Instead, Turn-On your ignition. Then gently push your pedal down to the floor (with your foot) and (with foot) allow it to 'gently' return. Then turn key and start. It should fire straight away".

Very interesting, I said. Thank you, I will try it. Returning to my Caddy, I thought I will try it (even though my car was warm, it generally takes a few 'cranks' to start).

So, instead, I turned on the ignition, gently pushed the accelator to the floor and allowed it to gently return. Then I turned the key and 'eureka' it started. How interesting I thought. I performed the same procedure throughout the day and success everytime.

The next morning, from cold, I tried the same procedure and again, started first time.

I shared the above story with my fellow members who were staying at the same motel. One '59 always needs a few turns. A '60 is even worse and the '47, well it gets really cranky as it turns over and over.

Each took on board what I shared with them and I stood back and watched each Caddy be started from cold AND every one of them started first time! Even the cranky '47!

If you have similar starting crumbles, give it a try and email me and let me know how you got on!
