There were 132 cars registered for the GN, but I know of several that were unable to attend. The 2024 GN in Gettysburg drew over 200 cars, with a much larger pre-war contingent than was present at this year's GN. East coast shows really draw a lot of cars. The 2026 GN in North Carolina should be no exception.

In addition to winning the Norm Uhlir Regional Activity Award, the icing on our Region's GN cake was Clayton Patterson and Michael Lott being award -ed First-Place in the **Touring Division for their** 2009 Cadillac DTS Sedan. Congratulations, Clayton and Mike!

Club sponsor, ELCO Cadillac's Sales Manager Bill Pastor, was my initial contact. He seemed pleased and even enthusiastic about the "Join Us" display program. He commented that the display cards looked classy and would be a great tie-in to ELCO's sponsorship of our Club. He positioned them in the customer lounge right off the showroom floor above the drink and snack counter—a location that is sure to be seen by any customer taking advantage of the complimentary refreshments.

I pointed out that my contact information is on the reverse side of the brochure holder and that he can contact me for more cards should they run out. Bill said he would be happy to do so.



My second visit was to Sapaugh Cadillac in Herculaneum, MO. The exciting news there is that they are nearing the completion of an all-new Cadillac-dedicated Sales and Service building, featuring the very beautiful Cadillac-approved design.

The receptionist quickly located Steven Charleville, who will be the Cadillac Sales Manager when the new building is completed. I told him about the Grand Nationals, driving tours, and local shows, as well as the impressive Club Museum in Hickory Corners, Michigan. Steven prompted me to share a picture of my 1976 Eldorado. Steven placed the brochure display at the reception desk and promised to find a prominent place for it in the new building. He thanked me for stopping by and invited me to their Grand Opening on June 5th. I told him that I would like to come; however, I will be at our Grand National.



Next was Quality Cadillac in Alton, IL, where I was greeted by their General Manager, David Stevenson. David was familiar with our Club because he knows Club member Bob Schuman.

David is a real car guy! He hosts an annual All GM Car Show at the dealership which he and Bob invited CLC-StL to attend last year. I enjoyed talking cars with him. We discussed some Cadillac design history, and he even mentioned that he

Roaring Automobiles: A Journey Through French Automotive Art and Innovation

From the glittering salons of post-World War I Paris to the racetracks that echoed with raw power and youthful exuberance, the French automobile became much more than a means of transportation—it emerged as a potent symbol of modernity and aesthetic innovation. At the Saint Louis Art Museum's exhibition, **Roaring: Art, Fashion, and the Automobile in France, 1918–1939**, a selective collection of 12 historic vehicles stands side by side with paintings, photographs, sculpture, furniture, films, and fashion. This immersive display invites you to explore how these rolling works of art encapsulate a transformative era in both technological and cultural expression.

Why should a Cadillac or LaSalle enthusiast, or any classic American car enthusiast for that matter, have interest in such an exhibit? As General Motors' first head of styling (appointed 1927), Harley Earl found his styling muse half a world away in the sumptuous, hand-built coachwork of pre-World War II France. Learn how this "French Connection" led Harley Earl to borrow pre-war French flair for GM's golden age.

Automobiles as Artistic Canvases

In an age when the automobile was still redefining mobility, French designers and engineers transformed each vehicle into an artistic statement. No longer mere conveyances for engineers, cars became both subject and object—the canvas upon which dreams, technological breakthroughs, and avant-garde aesthetics were expressed. The careful detailing in coach-built models, seen in examples like the 1937 Delahaye Type 135MS Special Roadster (#8 in the list) with its six-cylinder, 160 hp powerhouse and meticulously-crafted leather interiors by Hermès, epitomize this union of form and function. Every curve, every streamlined design element, reflects a commitment not only to performance but also to the emerging modernist temperament that sets the stage for a new cultural identity.

The Intersection of Design, Engineering, and Craftsmanship

The automobiles featured in the exhibit are testimonies to the interdisciplinary collaboration between innovative engineering and masterful design. Renowned designers such as Giuseppe Figoni and Carrosserie Vanvooren applied their vision, blending technical prowess with the flourishing elegance of Art Deco and aerodynamic principles. These vehicles were designed with not only speed and power in mind but also an appreciation of natural forms and sculptural curves. Their sumptuous details—be it through leather appointments, custom coach-built bodies, or bold emblematic forms—are reminders that the automobile was and remains a luxury object deeply intertwined with art, fashion, and a spirit of creative experimentation.

Highlighting the Masterpieces of a Golden Age

Each automobile in the exhibit carries its own story, marking milestones in the craft of custom coachbuilding and technological evolution. Among the highlights is the magnificence of models designed by legendary houses such as Delahaye and Automobiles Ettore Bugatti, as well as exemplars from Italian automotive designers like Ugo Zagato. Their designs speak to an era when automobiles were built to be admired as much as they were to be driven. The fluid lines and sculptural forms of these vehicles capture the innovative spirit of the interwar period—where every detail, from engine performance to the graceful curvature of the body, was considered an art form in itself.

A Parisian Apprenticeship by Exhibition

In the 1930s, the Paris Auto Salon was to car design what the Louvre is to painting: a proving ground for artistry and engineering. Earl traveled there repeatedly, soaking up the daring curves of Figoni et Falaschi's Teardrop Coupes and the gleaming chrome of René Lalique's jeweled mascots. Those annual pilgrimages exposed him to cars that were not just machines, but mobile sculptures—an ethos he determined to import back to Detroit.

Figoni, Falaschi & the Art of the Teardrop

No French coachbuilder impressed Earl more than Figoni & Falaschi. Their 1937 Talbot-Lago T150C "Goutte d'Eau" Teardrop, (#11 in the list) was a masterpiece of aerodynamic form: flowing fenders, a pointed nose, and a cabin that seemed to glide in a liquid sheet of metal. Earl absorbed that lesson in fluidity, later translating it into the Cadillac V-16 Series 90 (1938) with its pronounced hood louvers and integrated fenders.

Art Deco Gleam: Chrome, Brightwork & Crystal

French high-end jewelry house Lalique executed mascots and hood ornaments whose crystalline forms caught both light and imaginations. Earl commissioned similar custom pieces—remember the handcrafted "Goddess" ornament for Cadillac?—and plastered GM showrooms with gleaming brightwork. That Art Deco sparkle gave cars a jewel-like quality, a direct nod to Paris's luxury ateliers (the private workshops or studios of professional artists in the fine or decorative arts).

The Streamline Moderne Revolution

Aerodynamics were not just performance talk: they sold tickets to GM's annual Motorama, the traveling spectacle that debuted the Buick Y-Job (1938)—Earl's own "dream car". With its hidden headlights, one-piece bumpers, and pontoon-style fenders, the Y-Job wore the spirit of French Streamline Moderne like a tailor-made suit. Motorama audiences, primed by French teardrops and ocean-liner silhouettes, lapped it up.

From Concept to Production: Spreading the Style Gospel

By the 1940s and '50s, Earl's French-inspired elements had trickled down through every GM division:

- Pontoon Fenders: Borrowed from the uninterrupted wheel-arch curves of French coachbuilders.
- Integrated Grilles: Echoing the sleek, shield-shaped fronts of Talbot and Hispano-Suiza.
- Ornamental Hood Sculptures: From Lalique's crystal birds to GM's own cast-metal emblems.

The result? Cadillacs that looked like they would coast through air at 80 mph—even standing still.

Legacy: When Detroit Found Its European Muse

Earl's lifelong fascination with French design did not just fashion one generation of Cadillacs—it reshaped American taste. Tailfins of the late '50s, with their rocket-ship tips, owe a debt to French streamlining's emphasis on speed and motion. And every swooping roofline or graceful chrome strip on a post-war GM model still whispers, "Paris".

"Exposition d'Automobiles"

I highly recommend that you visit this Exposition d'Automobiles before it concludes on July 27th. The small pictures of the exhibited automobiles in this article do not do them justice, they MUST be seen in person! Do not miss this opportunity to visit and view the exhibit.

I find it appropriate now to quote two lines from the ending scene of the movie, *Meet Me In St. Louis,* about the extravagant 1904 St. Louis World's Fair:

- ⇒ Rose Smith (Lucille Bremmer): "We don't have to come on a train or stay in a hotel; it's right in our own hometown."
- ⇒ Esther Smith (Judy Garland): "I can't believe it, right here where we live. Right here in St. Louis."

1. 1923 Bugatti Type 32 "Tank de Tours"

Designed by the legendary Ettore Bugatti, the Type 32 "Tank de Tours" was produced by Automobiles Ettore Bugatti in Molsheim, France. Originally built for the racing circuits, its experimental suspension and streamlined body form set an early benchmark in automotive performance and design excellence.



2. 1925 Hispano Suiza H6B Labourdette Skiff Torpedo

Influenced by the artistic vision of Jean Henri Labourdette, this Hispano Suiza model was made for road use, blending engineering mastery with refined aesthetics.



3. 1927 Bugatti Type 35B Hellé Nice Grand Prix

Another showcase from Bugatti, the Type 35B Hellé Nice Grand Prix variant stands out as a high performance machine tailored for the racing elite. It represents how performance modifications could transform a production model into a competitor's weapon on the track—all while remaining an aesthetic marvel.



4. 1928 Citroën B14 Faux Cabriolet

This Citroën model represents a creative confluence of industrial design and fine art. Produced as part of the B14 range, its transformation involved an artistic reinterpretation that turned a functional vehicle into a moving canvas.



5. 1930 Alfa Romeo 6C 1750 Zagato Spider

A cross-cultural masterpiece, this Alfa Romeo model was designed by Italian icon Ugo Zagato and built for racing, capturing both speed and stellar design. The Alfa Romeo melds Italian design flair with high performance engineering.

6. 1931 Bugatti Type 41 "Royale" Weinberger Cabriolet (below left)

The Bugatti Royale series has long been synonymous with opulence. The 1931 Type 41 "Royale" Weinberger Cabriolet is a rare specimen representing luxury and exclusivity in automotive design.






7. 1936 Le Corbusier Voiture Minimum (above right)

An iconoclastic venture into minimalism, Le Corbusier's Voiture Minimum automobile styling concept explores how far one can strip down design to its elemental form while still retaining functionality. The auto manufacturers were not interested, and the concept was not further developed.

8. 1937 Delahaye Type 135MS Figoni et Falaschi Competition Court (Special Roadster)

Delahaye's 135MS model, reshaped in collaboration with the famed Figoni et Falaschi, epitomizes the harmony of performance and refined style.





9. 1937/1938 Delage D8 120S Chapron Cabriolet

This Delage model, rebodied by the celebrated coachbuilder Chapron, highlights the art of customization in the golden age of automobile design.



10. 1936/1937 Voisin Type C28 Aérosport Coupe (below left)

Voisin, a brand historically associated with aviation, translates aerodynamics to the road with the Type C28 Aérosport Coupe.




11. 1938 Talbot Lago T150C SS Figoni et Falaschi Coupe (above right)

Known for their robustness and elegance, Talbot Lago's T150C SS Coupe, styled in partnership with Figoni et Falaschi, radiates opulence.

12. 1939 Bugatti Type 57C Vanvooren Cabriolet

Closing the chronological journey is the Bugatti Type 57C Vanvooren Cabriolet—a culmination of Bugatti's legacy in fine automotive craftsmanship.
